Local Deaths

Dr. James Bruce Anderson

January 8, 1936 – August 15, 2022

Dr. James Bruce Anderson passed away peacefully on August 15, 2022. The funeral service was held on Friday, September 2, at 11 a.m. at St. Nicholas Orthodox Church in San Anselmo, California.

Jim was born and grew up in Chicago, Illinois. He earned a B.A. and M.A. in English at Southern Illinois University and a Ph.D. in English at the University of Iowa. His dissertation explored "St. John of the Cross: An Essay Toward A Mystical Aesthetic And A Translation Of His Major Poems." He married Mary Theresa Lackey in 1961 and they had three children: Mark, Timothy, and Kathleen. Whether it was Tim and his myriad extra-curricular pursuits (blacksmith, inventor, custom backpack fabricator, boat designer), Kathleen (ballet, track, music), or Mark (tennis, Math Olympiads), he encouraged them to explore whatever captured their interest. He also went out of his way to give them experience of the world, moving his young family to Palestine and Japan for year-long stays.

A Professor of English and specialist in Renaissance literature with an emphasis on Shakespeare, Jim taught at St. Cloud State University in Minnesota for over 40 years. He was dedicated to his students, who highly valued his classes, and inspired them with his passion for Shakespeare, John Donne, Ben Jonson, Tolstoy, and the Bible as Literature. He composed his own poetry and plays, including a dramatization of Tolstoy's "The Death of Ivan Ilyich," and mentored student writers in his creative writing courses. He was the first non-Japanese professor to teach at Akita University, where he taught English literature and English as a second language.

Jim was a talented athlete. In his youth, he was a competitive diver, and competed in gymnastics on the parallel bars and the flying rings, performing the "double cut and catch" maneuver before it was eliminated as too dangerous. A skilled tennis player for many years, he enjoyed play-

ing doubles with his wife. Jim appreciated nature, animals, and agrarian life. He relished visiting his relatives on their Illinois farms as well as spending time with his family at their Minnesota cabins and on camping trips.

A deeply compassionate person, Jim helped Vietnam veterans who struggled with addiction, resocialization and employment challenges. Kind, generous, hospitable, and a great listener, he was always ready to assist and encourage others, even when they seemed beyond help. He possessed many friends from a wide variety of cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds, and admired their diverse virtues and talents.

Jim was a devoted husband and father; strong Christian; talented educator; brilliant scholar; and caring friend. He will also be remembered for his quiet, reflective nature, humility, quick wit, and sense of humor—particularly his puns and Swedish jokes. He stayed in touch with his extended family across the country. He valued old people, old scholars, old things, and old ways. He was an honorable man, and always did what he said he would do. He was cheerful to the end. When he could barely breathe, he could still laugh.

Jim was preceded in death by his father, John Arthur Anderson; his mother, Madge Merchant; his older brother, John Anderson; and his older sister, Jane (Anderson) Neuhaus. He is survived by his wife of 63 years, Mary Theresa Anderson; son, Mark Anderson and wife Sudha Prathikanti; son, Tim Anderson and girlfriend Audrey Yang; daughter, Kathleen Anderson; and nephews Art Anderson (wife Kate and sons John and William) and Dale Anderson (wife Brenda, daughter Elizabeth, and son Price). He is also survived by his good friend, Sam McLean. Jim was much loved and we will miss him. May he rest in peace.

Jan. 15, 1951 – Aug. 30, 2022


Resident of Alameda
