also a bus line that conveniently leaves Alameda twice an hour for downtown San Francisco (seniors are \$3 or less than half the toll to cross the Bay Bridge by car). The City of Alameda offers a FREE shuttle that loops around several business areas of the island three days a week. All these options mean we can own and use fewer cars.

You say there are not enough bikers at this time to support new bike lanes. Of course not! Cars are driving too fast and recklessly. But, the City of Alameda has developed a transportation plan to make pedestrians and bicyclists safer by being more visible and separating bikes from cars. These changes enable pedestrians and bicyclists to both feel and be safer. As these plans are implemented, Alameda will see more people leave their cars at home.

I understand and appreciate that walking or bicycling aren't possible for everyone. However, if you are able but unwilling to walk, unwilling to ride a bicycle (bike, trike, or e-bike) for short distance errands, or unwilling to use public transit, then perhaps you should gracefully endure some small inconvenience when using your car to drive locally in Alameda. The more we use an alternative to personal cars, the

better it will be for Alameda's environment and our health.

## What's wrong with saying Presidents' Day/Week?

**Editor:**  
Those of us who have kin or skin in public education probably noticed that students enrolled in public schools did not attend classes from Feb. 18 until Feb. 27 inclusive. By contrast, those pesky, over-achieving private schools remained in session — my heart goes out to those children corralled by high expectation.

Is it any wonder that hoity-toity private schools are always siphoning ambitious students away from the bastions of quality day care and woke inculcation? The recent hiatus from the rigors or non-rigors of learning — depending on the academic attitude you are saddled with — was inappropriately called "Ski Week." The name alone is a micro-aggression right up there with incendiary phrases like "work ethic" or "rational self-interest" or "objective reality" or worst of all "balanced budget."

The anachronism "Ski Week" positively smacks of elitism. Personally, I have nothing against

elitism; how else is an egalitarian or a collectivist going to gain a sense of superiority or hierarchy or feel more equal than the hoi polloi.

None-the-less "Ski Week," even to a closet conservative, does have an alarming elitist ring to it. In addition to slapping on hickory slats, skiing involves transportation, lodging, eating, apres-ski shenanigans and most importantly, for those of us who don't walk up the slopes carrying our skis, pricey lift tickets.

Given hyperinflation, an actual "Ski Week" could cost hundreds of dollars just for the fuel pumps alone, forgetting the price tags on grog, fun and fondue. As an AP Statistics teacher at an unnamed West End high school, I conducted a survey of amongst my remaining students. As an aside, I say "remaining students" because this has been a banner year for "teacher shopping" — the opportunities for side-stepping rigor have never been better. As we never say in public education, "Rigor is inimical to equity."

Of the 100 students who missed out on the exodus and did not opt to climb over the fence — only four of my stalwart students admitted to having gone skiing over the misnamed "Ski Week." I call them "stalwart students" but perhaps they were experiencing a variant of Stockholm Syndrome.

Given the results of my survey, we might have called it "Maui Week" given that an equal number of students claimed to have basked at sea level in tropical Hawaii as opposed to hitting the high altitudes of the Sierra Nevadas. It was noted with a sense of relief surmounted by job satisfaction, that not one student elected to ski at the impolitic "Squaw Valley" — a tribute to the efficacy of woke education.

Then too, we might have called it "Ski Week" because roughly the same number of students have a family name that ends with "ski" — Jeruwalski and Evanowski being two notables.

At last count, the percentage of students on "free or reduced lunch" was ascending past 70%. This is not exactly the demographic who will be schussing, waddling, paralleling or telemarking down the warming alpine pistes. Next year, we might opt for another excuse for a February vacation in order to highlight the advantages of a public school over a private education.

I know this might sound patriotic, I toss a proactive apology to the sensitive woke, but perhaps we could call it "Presidents' Week."
