Why Alzheimer's Disease is a Public Health Issue

April 4 through 10 was National Public Health Week. COVID-19 is the most talked-about public health issue among Americans right now, but signs are pointing to a decline in cases and a loosening of masking and social-distancing policies as cases die down. But there is a growing public health issue, with significant impacts to many Californians looming on the horizon — Alzheimer's disease.

You might not think of Alzheimer's disease as a public health issue. Perhaps you think of it as only an elder care issue. But here are some reasons why

it's more than that:

- The large number of people projected to have the disease
- The huge burden in both time and money for patients and their caregivers
- Public health interventions are available to lessen the impact of the disease

You probably know someone right now that either has Alzheimer's, cares for someone with Alzheimer's, or has someone with Alzheimer's in their extended family. It's a public health issue.

The large number of Alzheimer's Patients

There are currently about 690,000 people living with Alzheimer's in California. By 2040, that number is expected to more than double. Nationally, there are six million Alzheimer's patients and 14 million projected by 2050. However, the number of healthcare providers (doctors, nurses, facilities, etc.) is declining.

The Burden in Time and Money for Patients and Caregivers

The cost of a memory care facility in the Bay Area starts at about \$7,000 a month and goes up. Unless you have long-term care insurance (most people don't) the burden of these high costs falls squarely on the patient and their family (Medi-Cal doesn't cover the cost of room and board at a memory care facility). Many caregivers can't afford the cost of a facility, or they choose to provide

care in the home but as a result have to cut back on work, retire early, or quit their jobs to provide the round-the-clock care necessary for the later stages of Alzheimer's. It's a 24/7/365 job, which can lead to caregiver burn-out, stress and other health issues.

Available Public Health Interventions

By gathering data and researching Alzheimer's disease as a public health issue that affects us all, we can put in place a few interventions to the disease:

- Earlier detection and diagnosis
- Information on lifestyle risk factors such as smoking and lack of physical activity
- Training for doctors to be able to detect Alzheimer's earlier
- Information, training and services for caregivers

Call to Action

Thankfully, Barbara Lee can play an important role in addressing this critical issue. By funding the BOLD Infrastructure for Alzheimer's Act at \$30 million, Barbara Lee can expand the ability of our state and local public health departments to address this growing public health issue.
