## Newest Eatery in Town Opens

Local foodies were invited to attend a special debut of Trabocco Kitchen and Cocktails, a new restaurant that just opened at South Shore Center. Founded by Alameda residents Chef Giuseppe Naccarelli — a native of Palombaro, Italy — and his wife, Christine, the eatery officially opened Monday.

Reflective of the chef's heritage is the restaurant's name. Trabocchi are a type of fishing pier unique to the Adriatic coastline of Italy's Abruzzo region. Trabocco presents a contemporary view of classic Italian cuisine, emphasizing locally sourced and organic ingredients.

The menu features *stuzzichini* (small bites), authentic thin crust pizza, rustic baked and roasted delicacies from a wood

burning oven, meat and fish on the rotisserie and fresh pastas and breads made in-house daily.

"Our farm-to-table restaurant is approachable and meant to impart the warmth and strong sense of community," said Chef Giuseppe. "We look forward to becoming a natural gathering place for locals and visitors alike." Prior to opening Trabocco, Chef Naccarelli was with the successful Il Fornaio chain of restaurants.

For now Trabocco will focus on dinner service with the addition of lunch and Sunday Brunch coming soon.

### Elizabeth Trimble Crosman

On Oct. 18, 2013, Elizabeth Trimble Crosman passed away. Known fondly by many names, including Trim, Cita, Ceed, Rita,

Betts, Betty, and Elizabeth, she preferred to be called Trim, an abbreviation of her maiden name, Trimble. She was a firebrand, an outspoken critic, and a pragmatic advocate of women's rights and racial equality. She entered the field of computer programming at age 40, being one of the first to break the gender barrier.

Trim had a younger brother and sister, living in Williamsburg, Va, rebuilt by her father for Rockefeller. Later, after World War II, she and her husband, Dorland Crosman, settled in Glen Ridge, New Jersey. She entered the workforce in 1967 in computer programming and enjoyed a very successful 40-year career with high tech firms. In

1984, after a divorce, she moved to Foster City, and lived there 28 years. In 2007 she retired as a consultant from the San Francisco court system. She recently moved to the Waters Edge Lodge in Alameda.

She will forever be a celebrated figure for her warmth, humor, her zest for life, her generosity, and her deep love for others. She is survived by her four children, Margot Crosman of Alameda, Robert Crosman of Guilford, Conn., Darcy Crosman of El Sobrante and Peter Crosman of La Canada, Calif; the spouses of her children, David Berks, Betsey Borden and Deborah Short; her four grandchildren, Miles, Kyle, Katharine, and Maya.
